
Junior Hockey – What’s Changing and Why It Matters

Why are clubs talking about change?

Junior hockey across Northern Sydney is facing some real challenges:

- **Fewer kids playing**, especially in younger age groups
- **Long travel times** and late nights for families
- **Mixed skill levels** being pushed into full-field competitions too early
- **Less enjoyment and engagement** for many children

Clubs are concerned that if nothing changes, **even fewer kids will start or stay in hockey** over the next few years.

Our shared goal is simple:

👉 **More kids playing hockey, enjoying hockey, and staying in hockey.**

What’s the problem with the current system?

Under 12s are being pushed too fast

Many Under 12 players are being required to play **full-field, long-travel competitions**, even when:

- They are new to hockey
- Teams have small or mixed ability numbers
- Families struggle with time and distance

This can lead to:

- Kids getting less ball time
 - Confidence dropping
 - Families leaving the sport earlier than expected
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What are clubs proposing instead?

A stronger local, development-focused option (especially for Under 12s)

Clubs are exploring **locally run competitions** that focus on:

- **Smaller-sided or half-field games**
- **Shorter travel and consistent locations**
- **High engagement and lots of ball touches**
- **Fun, skill development, and confidence**

Research across many sports shows that **small-sided games help kids learn faster, enjoy sport more, and stay involved longer.**

What does this mean for my child?

For younger or developing players

- More involvement in games
- More touches of the ball
- Less pressure, more learning
- Playing with friends in a community environment

For confident or advanced players

- Strong development through high-engagement formats
- Opportunities to play full-field as they are ready
- Clear pathways still available

For families

- Less time in the car
 - More predictable schedules
 - A stronger club and community feel
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Is elite or representative hockey going away?

No.

Representative and higher-level pathways remain important for players who want and are ready for them.

What clubs are discussing is **better balance**, especially at younger ages:

- Development before results

- Enjoyment before selection pressure
 - Building the base so elite pathways remain strong in the future
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Will parents still have choice?

Yes.

Clubs are not removing choice — they are **creating better options**.

Families will continue to:

- Choose what suits their child's development
 - Move between pathways as kids grow and change
 - Be part of the decision-making process
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Why focus on community and local hockey?

Parents consistently tell clubs that kids stay in sport when they:

- Feel they belong
- Play with friends
- See familiar faces each week
- Enjoy the experience, not just the result

Strong local competitions help:

- New families join hockey
 - Older kids mentor younger ones
 - Clubs remain healthy and sustainable
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What happens next?

- Clubs will continue working together on **clear, practical options**
- Any changes will be **communicated early and clearly**
- Parents will have opportunities to ask questions and give feedback

Nothing will change overnight — but doing nothing is no longer an option.
